

Local Naturalist uses hobby to aid river

Illustrated guide will help identify proper willows for riverbank projects

Landscapers, biologists and naturalists will soon have an illustrated guide to help them identify the Kenai Peninsula's 20 species of willow.

Dominique Collet, a self-taught naturalist, is teaming with the Kenai Watershed Forum to produce the handbook. Grants from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Wasilla Soil and Water Conservation District will pay for the publishing costs.

Willows have long been a diet staple for the peninsula's moose. Lately, landscapers have discovered the willow as an important tool to fight river erosion. The fast-growing, hearty plants anchor riverbanks with their thick roots, creating good fish habitat in the process.

Not all willows are created equal, though. Of the 20 local willow species, only three or four thrive along the banks of rivers, according to Collet. If you can identify those varieties, revegetation projects are easy.

"All you have to do is cut a stick and poke it in the ground and it will grow," Collet said. "If you use the wrong species,

you're wasting your time."

At least a few riverfront owners learned that lesson the hard way. Willows that should have flourished died.

It's an easy mistake to make, Collet says. Many of the willows look similar, making them tricky to identify.

Collet's guide should help. In addition to written descriptions of the plants, Collet's watercolor paintings will give frustrated landscapers visual clues.

"What I'm trying to do is to make something user-friendly," he said. "The idea is to make something like a field guide for birds."

Collet moved to Alaska in 1978 from Belgium, where he guided bird watchers. He has lived on the Kenai Peninsula for 15 years. He lives in Sterling with his children Crystal, Nikki and Daniel. He is a carpenter by trade, but expects to work fultime on the willow guide this summer and fall. If all goes well, the guide will be available next year.

Collet wrote a book on Kenai willows in 1996. That book is more technical in nature, useful primarily to botanists.



When Pat Dye taught school in Cooper Landing, he regularly led students out of the classroom and onto the banks of nearby creeks to measure water quality and teach biology lessons. Now that he has retired, Pat continues his streamside visits as part of KWF's Water Quality Monitoring Program.

Once a month for the past two years, Pat has tested the waters at Quartz Creek and Cooper Creek near Cooper Landing. He was supposed to add Dave's Creek to his rounds last month, but came across some resistance.


"There was a brown bear in the area feeding on a moose carcass," he said. Monitoring could wait another month.

Quartz Creek and Cooper Creek both appear healthy, according to Pat. There is a big difference between the two creeks, though.Cooper Creek flows out of the bottom of a dam, resulting in colder water and fewer fish.

In retirement, Pat enjoys woodworking and photography. His real passion, though, is competitive shooting. He shoots a pistol and a large-bore rifle.

"It's something I've done all my life and now I have some time to concentrate on it," he said. He hasn't entered any competitions yet, but hopes to do so soon.

Pat would like to pass on his knowledge of guns to kids in Cooper Landing. He recently became a certified rifle instructor with the National Rifle Association and would like to teach youth classes in marksmanship and gun safety.

While Dave Westerman eyes Juneau and Bean Creek

For nearly every month over the last three years, Dave Westerman has made the one-mile walk from his Cooper Landing home to test the waters of Juneau Creek and Bean Creek as part of KWF's Water Quality Monitoring Program.

Based on the data he has collected, the two Kenai River tributaries appear to be healthy, Dave says. He has noticed a color change in Bean Creek over the years – from green to brown – "but that could be caused by many factors," he said. He does not believe the change affects the water quality.

During the summer season, Dave operates sonar counters for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game. During the six months he is not watching sockeye salmon pass the counters, he works as a substitute teacher and volunteers in the community.

"Most of our kids (in Cooper Landing) don't have the opportunity to play basketball," said Westerman. So he helps coach youth teams and sets up games with nearby towns like Moose Pass

Westerman also organizes an adult softball tournament with 10 teams. A local charity uses the tournament's concession stand to make money.

Westerman is married to Terri Tobias and has three children. He has lived in Cooper Landing since 1984.

Soldotna teen Carly Miller helps KWF study pike habits

When Carly Miller recently looked into the stomachs of pike caught in local lakes, she discovered some surprises. With the help of biologists and teachers, she found three-spine sticklebacks, nine-spine sticklebacks and freshwater shrimp, but no salmon or trout.

Many worry that the pike, predator fish introduced into local lakes, could decimate trout and salmon populations. So not finding evidence of trout and salmon in their diets is a good thing, right?

"We think the pike that were caught were in lakes that have had pike for a while, so there aren't any salmon or salmon eggs left," said Carly, a sophomore at Soldotna High School.

Carly presented her results at the Caring for the Kenaï, a local contest that challenges students to research an environmental problem and pose solutions. She won third place.

"I've helped my dad fillet fish after he caught them, but I've never dissected them like I did for this experiment," said Carly, who is earning an A+ in her high school biology class. "I learned a lot, especially about pike and the pike's impact on salmon."

Carly believes that educating the public about those impacts is crucial to controlling the pike problem. She also believes that fishing derbies, like the one KWF and Soldotna Trustworthy Hardware sponsored this last winter, are a good way to help cut into the pike population.


